

PROVIDENCE OR LUCK?

During 2020, with lots of time at home, I've spent hours reading with our youngest two children, aged 11 and 10. We've enjoyed many series of books, such as the Narnia chronicles, throughout this time. We are currently finishing off the Laura Ingalls Wilder 'Little House on the Prairie' series, with 'Farmer Boy', which Laura wrote about the childhood of her husband, Almanzo.

Yesterday, we read a chapter called 'The



Strange Dog'. In it, Almanzo's father was pleased to hear that "New York horse-buyers were in the neighbourhood" as he had two four-year-old colts ready. The horse-buyer visits their farm and, after haggling over the price, they agree on \$200 each. He gives Father \$200 now and says that he'll give him the rest, for the second horse, when they are delivered to him in town, the next day. Father is unable to get to the bank, due to the late hour in the day, so they have to keep the money - a lot, back then - in the house overnight. Mother is worried sick, and keeps moving where the money is hidden. They comfort themselves with the thought that nobody knows they are holding it overnight. During the evening, before bed, they are visited by a strange dog. They are unable to have a dog, on the farm, due to the fact a dog would chase chickens, dig up their vegetable garden or kill sheep. However, they take pity on the very thin, cringing dog and feed him, thinking they can drive him away, the next day. Overnight, Mother hears the dog growling and sees the dog warily walking around outside. The next morning, Father "found the tracks of two men's boots" and surmises that the horse-buyer had accomplices who would have robbed him without the dog's actions, as the sheriff later told him that a farmer in this situation had robbers visit who "tied up his wife and children, ... beat him almost to death, to make him tell where the money was hidden ... took the money and got away."

Although they never saw the homeless dog again, Mother said "she would always believe that Providence had sent the strange dog to watch over them". Almanzo feels they were rewarded for feeding him and Mother agrees, declaring that, "Maybe he was sent to try us ... Maybe the Lord was merciful to us because we were merciful to him."

Now some would say it was just luck or a coincidence. I choose to believe in Providence, which is the care and control of God. There are probably many times that we have missed seeing how God has moved in our lives. How often does our Lord orchestrate the most amazing set of circumstances to save us from harm, or help us along our way, and we just breezily write them off? He is the God of everything! All situations and people are under His control. He can more than arrange events and actions to suit His purposes. Will everything go our way? No! However, we can absolutely trust the living God with our lives and eternal futures. He sees the good we do for others, in whatever form it takes, and will reward us either in this life, or the next.

I hope this encourages you, as it did me.



COMPLIANCE & RISK IN THE CHRISTIAN SCHOOL

It's been a great privilege for me to work at St Andrews Christian College for the last two years. I have been a teacher and leader in other Christian Schools for many years, and I can assure you that this is a College that really seeks to be a Christian community more than an organisation, where everyone involved – teachers, students, administrators and parents as well – is challenged to know and follow Christ. St Andrews holds true to its

original vision and mission, seeking to be truly Christian in practice, in word and deed, not just in name. That is a constant challenge and it requires courage and commitment, every day.

I want to propose that compliance and risk are very much at the heart of Christian life and service, not because we are risk-averse or forced to comply, but because we choose to align ourselves with Jesus, with biblical principles for life, following in word and deed, the teachings of Jesus.

Compliance has to do with following the rules, keeping the law, being obedient to commands and expectations, out of respect, responsibility and, dare I say, love for God and for our neighbour! We have just come through one of the toughest lockdown regimes in our history. We were asked to stay at home, to wear masks when outside and to practice social distancing. Did we always feel like complying? Not at all! It was restrictive of our freedoms, and made us change our behaviour. But, because we could see it was for the common good, that it could protect our

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family, neighbours and friends, we complied. The result of our compliance has been the virtual elimination of COVID-19 in our state!

As nice as this illustration is, it is not specifically a Christian response. When Jesus spoke with his disciples in John 14, he said, '*If you love me, show it by doing what I have told you*.' (*v 15*) and '*the person who knows my commandments and keeps them, that's who loves me!*'(*v21*). Jesus' commands are mostly about acting out of love, for God and for our neighbour. He puts relationship first, personal benefit and gratification last. In fact, He calls us to sacrificial love, to lay down our lives for others, and He demonstrated this dramatically on the Cross.

Risk is a more complex concept to work with. *God does not call us to a life of avoiding risk*. In fact, following Jesus involves a lot of risk, a lot of moving outside of our comfort zone. *We are required to manage risk*. Throughout my work in schools I have been involved in getting students out of the classroom into the great outdoors, where they learn a whole

raft of personal and social skills not possible within the classroom. It's always riskier to be outside, in the bush, climbing a tree or a mountain, swimming in the ocean or navigating a ropes course. But we manage those risks because the benefits are many. I like the phrase, '*Out of the comfort zone, into the challenge zone, but not into the danger zone.*'.

We all need challenges and the excitement and focus that taking some risk involves. But, we can still act responsibly. We face our fears, test ourselves, but we don't act stupidly. We look before we leap! Risk Management is all about assessing risk and doing what we can to be safe, able to enjoy learning and doing.

My role at St Andrews involves ensuring that our policies and procedures comply with the law and that our students, to whom we owe a duty of care, are safe and doing well, thriving academically, emotionally and spiritually. If my work ends up as just words on a page, on a computer or in a folder on a shelf, then it's a waste of time! Our policies and procedural expectations must be practiced. This leads to consistent, responsible and caring supervision and teaching. It allows us to challenge students but not to put them in danger. It seeks their growth and development into confident, skilled and empathetic young men and women. They learn that living for Christ involves compliance, service and sacrifice, but it is immensely satisfying. In the end, this is what Christian Education is all about.

Romans 12:9-20 is a great summary of a practical, obedient, sacrificial Christian life. Read and reflect!

PROTECTING YOUR CHILD WITH ASTHMA

If your child currently has asthma, please make sure you have yearly reviews with your GP about their asthma to ensure that they have the right <u>asthma medication, know how</u> to use it properly and that your child has good control of their <u>asthma</u>.

It is also important that the student has an asthma action plan and that they see the GP to ensure that it includes advice for thunderstorm asthma. Ensure the student has a reliever


medication, like ventolin, along with a spacer stored in sick bay.

If your child is at risk of developing asthma symptoms throughout the day, please provide the appropriate medications which can be stored in sick bay. The student's Operoo (formerly known as CareMonkey) Care Profile should be updated with any current medical information.



Every year there is a rise in asthma flare-ups when children return to school after the summer holidays. This results in an increase in Emergency Department visits, hospitalisations and days off school.

MAKE SURE YOUR CHILD IS ASTHMA READY BY FOLLOWING THESE STEPS:



- has symptoms during the day more than 2 days per week
- has to stop activities such as playing or exercise because they get asthma symptoms
- wakes up with asthma during the night or early morning
- needs reliever more than 2 times days per week (not including prior to exercise) then take your child to their doctor as this indicates signs of worsening asthma.

Children over 12 can take an Asthma Control Test, a score under 20 indicates partial or poor asthma control.



On Friday 4th December the Preps enjoyed a lovely day out at Rickett's Point keeping cool with a splash in the sea.




GUMBUYA WORLD FUN
