For growth and transformation, to lean on and trust Jesus more, I would put every staff member and student in Year 9/10 in a developing country for a couple of weeks to realise they have much to contribute and much to learn from the locals. Everyone becomes more grateful and thankful for what they do have and not what they don't have back in Australia!

I too, always learn when I am in a developing country. It is a great leveller of what is important and a way to come back to the basics in life. Obviously this is in the living conditions, but especially apt in the importance of relationships and how most communities in developing countries exhibit this value far better than we do in Australia. We are so independent, competitive and too busy in life. In the Solomon Islands, people live better in community and share their modest belongings and resources far more generously than we do.

As Christians we have much to learn in how to live in a better way, as God designed us to live, in relationship with Him and with each other, sharing our talents and resources for the benefit of others and for God's glory.

For the students, it was a technology free couple of weeks, where they were not allowed to take their phones or devices. Relationships became the priority – as students and staff really got to know each other!







Some reflections from the students on the Solomon Islands Service Learning Trip:

- Stepping out of my comfort zone really pushed me.
- I have learnt to be grateful for everything in every situation.
- I have learnt to trust God with my whole heart, no matter how things look on the outside.
- God has taught me self-confidence and how to spread His love and His light.
- I want to be an influence.
- The trip has made a difference in my life as I want to be positive about everything I have and in every situation.
- This is my first real experience of seeing God actively working in ways we didn't expect. Now I know what that looks like and will continue to look for God's action. I felt like I clearly saw God's deliberate hand at work.
- I have learnt gratitude. I've always been thankful for what I have but this trip has made me thankful for EVERYTHING I have, even the little things like spatulas and non-stick frying pans.
- I have learnt community. All the people in the Solomons are dependent on each other. They sit down and actually talk. Ferjie told me that she knew everyone in her church and that lots of them were her family. That's the sort of community we need back home. We need to take a step back from our busy lives and technologies and actually talk and get to know each other.
- Throughout this trip I have really discovered God is real through the passion of all the people in the Solomons.
- Hopefully the skills of conversation that I have learnt while in the Solomons will help
 me to talk to other people about my experience on this trip and about who God is to
- What I enjoyed most on this trip was getting to know the actual members on the trip.
 We all became like family.
- The two most important things I've learnt through this trip is how to be more grateful for the things we have as well as not to take things for granted; how to trust in God's

plan more and no matter what, look at the positive side of things.

- The way I look at life has 100% changed. I will be more grateful and more positive on life's outlook.
- I'm going to thank God more for what I have in life.
- I have experienced God through the joyfulness of the kids and the way they thank
 God for everything, even if they have nothing.

We are commanded to serve, "Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms." 1 Peter 4:10.

So it is important that we aim to develop a service mindset that is incorporated into every aspect of the College.



It is about developing a missional mindset so that our students understand what it is to be a disciple of Jesus, wherever they go and whatever they do, be that at home, university, the workplace or overseas. It's about developing a heart for servant-hood and knowing we are all called to serve in the way God made each of us. In our love for God and other people, we serve to be a light for Jesus. Thanks to the many people who came to share the evening with us (well over 400) and to the many staff (led by our Middle School) and students who put this evening together. You are all amazing!








YEARS 5 & 6 DO THIER BIT FOR THE PIN-PONG CHALLENGE

WISE ADVICE FOR VCE STUDENTS

FROM ALUMNI CALEB WU



Past student Caleb has some wise advice for our VCE students leading up to exams.

Hi all, I've been invited to share some advice for current students, particularly for those completing their VCE.

My name is Caleb, and I graduated last year (2018), so the memories of Year 12 are still quite fresh. VCE is a long

journey, but there is a long break ahead. And Uni, if you plan to go, is very fresh and exciting,

so look forward to that! I hope my advice is helpful to you. But I know that what worked for me may not work for some people, so feel free not to follow any of it.

Firstly, most of this only works if you actually want to do well, if you want to do the best you can. If you aren't motivated to do well, and can't maintain that motivation throughout the year, it can be very hard. I learnt early on in Year 12 that it was going to be a long and hard grind. This knowledge helped me pace myself, because I knew I had to last the whole year. But it also reminded me that it had a definite endpoint, and that I only had to hold out until November, and then it would be finished. A lot of VCE was about finding out how far I could push myself and making sure I could get as close to that as possible without collapsing.

Study

Study hard, but make sure your study is effective. Do what works for you, but make sure it works. For me, 90% of my study was doing past/practice exams or Checkpoints. Application of learning is usually better than writing notes, and practice exams make you think, help you familiarise yourself with the content, and makes you focus. And not to mention that sometimes VCAA is lazy and repeats old questions. I didn't start by timing myself, but I found that having time pressure and simulating exam conditions helped me reduce distractions. And I guess not having social media also helped. Finally, there is a point when sleep becomes more important than study. If your study is not being effective because you are too tired—sleep! There's no point staying up late studying if you can't perform your best during the SAC or exam.

Breaks

I think this is where it gets most subjective, because some people take too many breaks, and some take too few. What worked for me was taking good quality breaks. I studied hard during the week, and late on Saturday nights, sometimes a couple hours into Sunday morning. But I made an effort not to study or even think about school on nearly every Sunday. Spend time to pray and remember that VCE is just a small stage of your life. My advice is don't take too many days off, but make sure you make full use of them. Don't plan to do too much on your days off, just relax and forget about school for a moment.

Conclusion

I know everyone says this, and maybe I'm not the right person to be saying this, but your ATAR does not define you. Enjoy your last years at school. Appreciate your teachers. Even if they are going through the most tedious material, sometimes their offhand advice can be golden. Enjoy the intimacy of knowing the people around you and seeing them every day in the same building. And cherish your time with people, because it goes by so fast.

Parent Participation Hours

During the year, notices will be sent out requesting parent help at various events or activities, such as helping at sports carnivals, covering library books, icy pole Fridays, 2nd Hand Uniform Shop, PFA events, classroom help or attending working bees.

Parents are required to record the hours they have completed in the Parent Hours Book which is kept in the College Office. You will be charged a Parent Participation fee of \$250 at the commencement of each year and will be credited at the end of the term for any work done. You will be credited at a rate of \$25 per hour of work completed, up to a maximum of \$250 for the year. The time requirement for each family is ten hours per year.

PHYSICS ON ICE









On Tuesday 30th July, the Year 11 Physics class went curling at O Brien's Icehouse at Docklands. We wanted to perform some experiments on an almost frictionless surface. Records were made of how fast the 20 kg kettles travelled across the ice and what happened when they collided with each other. We also created a Newton's Cradle with the kettles and pulled and pushed each other on toboggans. The purpose of the excursion was to calculate momentum and deceleration of the kettles. The class will now analyse videos we took of the collisions and perform some calculations relating to the wider physics topic of 'Motion'.

MIDDLE SCHOOL ARTISTS ARE CONSTRUCTING




I am once again so impressed by my amazing Middle School Artists.

Year 6, having completed a stunning collaborative piece, are now working on their Prep Buddy Project. All Year 6s spent time interviewing their Buddy, supporting them as they considered how they have grown to be more like Jesus this year - completing a drawing of a 'Fruit of the Holy Spirit' character. Each Year 6 student will then bring their Buddy's concept to life as a handsewn toy.

Year 7 have completed their ceramic 'Community of Light' houses! These were an integral part of the creative design for our Jesus, Light of the World Event held last week. This term, they are integrating their learning in Humanities by creating a Modroc plaster model of a Roman artifact - greater than life size - aged as though it was found in a recent archeological dig. The aim is for teams of students to collaborate in their research, construction and completion of this project.





Year 8 are working in clay to produce a replica of a shoe! Each student has brought in a shoe that represents their passion - a swim training flipper, a sports shoe, a tiny baby sister's shoe, a comfortable shoe - and are considering how they walk (with confidence, integrity, compassion).

This year we have focused on how Jesus is the Light of the World but the rest of our verse this year says, 'those who WALK in him will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life'. As Year 8 prepares for transition to Senior School, decides on electives and considers how they are living as Faithfully Devoted Servants of Christ, they are asking very deep and considered questions. 


