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Greetings Friends!

I am so sorry about the sudden closure of the College on Tuesday. It was so inconvenient for everyone, especially as it was done at the last moment. We had no prior information about the power outage (due to a car accident) and when we found out that it would take most of the day before power would resume, we had no option but to close the College for the day, mainly because of OH&S reasons.

It has been a difficult term for many people, with COVID, lockdowns, storms and power cuts. We are in awe of all our students and families who have had to make many changes to constantly adjust each day in their schooling, work and home life.

Our staff have been amazing in how they have adapted to remote learning and the constant changes that have been demanded of them.

It has not been easy to change 'school' with only a few hours' notice. Many exams, excursions, camps, events, and the GAT have had to be reorganised. As we remained open for 'permitted' workers, there was also a constant unknown each day, as we arranged staff to be on site to supervise these students from all year levels.

Academically our students are progressing, what I am more concerned about is the wellbeing of our students.

I have been undertaking mental health courses to assist our staff in understanding mental health issues and we now have several staff trained in Youth Mental Health First Aid and Teen Mental Health First Aid.

This year, our Year 7 students will undertake the RAP (Resilient Adolescent Program), which will be taught by their Home Room teacher and the Teen Mental Health First Aid Course (TMHFA) will be rolled out to all students in Years 8,9,10 and 11. Two other staff members will join me in teaching the TMHFA courses.

It is vital that our students undertake the TMHFA training, knowing that one in four young people will present with mental health problems in their adolescence. There is evidence that this course saves lives as young people have a preference in going to another young person to help them out rather than going to an adult. The TMHFA course:

- Helps reduce the impact of crisis situations.
- Gives young people the knowledge to recognise warning signs; offer and provide support; knowledge of and importance of self-care; and, how to guide a friend towards seeking appropriate adult help.
- Guides students to be able to help a friend with a possible mental health problem, or a friend in a mental health crisis, until a responsible adult can take over.

You will receive notice about these courses from our Secondary Wellbeing Coordinator, Mrs Marina Heading.

It is good to engage with your child when they are doing these courses as to what they are learning and gleaning from this training. It is good to talk about wellbeing and mental health, and dismantle the stigma that often surrounds people with mental illness. It is just an illness like physical illnesses and can mostly be treated with good medical care and support.

If your child is struggling in any way, please first see their *HOME ROOM TEACHER* who, if needed, will refer students to the **Wellbeing Team: Rev Warwick Grant (College Chaplain)**, Mrs Marina Heading (Secondary) and Mrs Sonia Sires (Primary).

We continue to pray for all our students, staff and families.

Please join us on Tuesday nights at 8pm (during term time) for fellowship and prayer, praying for our special school. It is done on ZOOM and is only for half an hour.

Enrolments for 2022

We have commenced our planning for 2022 and confirming places for new students to start in Term 1, 2022. Unless we have been advised, we are assuming that all current students will be returning to the College in 2022.



If a student is not returning to the

College, in line with the enrolment policy, one term's notice in writing is required. If the notice is not received on time, one term's tuition fees in lieu of notice will be charged. This requirement is clearly noted in the Enrolment Agreement Form which all parents/guardians signed when their child(ren) was enrolled.

To assist our planning please advise the College by Friday 17th September 2021 if a student is not returning to the College in 2022. The notice should be addressed to the College Registrar and can be sent via email to registrar@standrews.vic.edu.au It will be helpful to receive this notice as soon as possible as it will allow us to offer any vacant places to students on our waiting lists.

If there are siblings of current students wanting to enrol at the College, it is important that parents submit an <u>Application for Admission</u> two years prior to the planned year of entry. This allows the College to provide a priority place for siblings of current students. Siblings are not guaranteed a place if the Application for Admission is late. Late applicants will be placed onto the waiting list.


After our lunch break we went on a walking tour and the students had the opportunity to draw various sculptures and also create a small sculpture with natural materials.


Year 6 Captains Excursion

Year 12 Mathematical Methods – Modelling Autonomous Driving

Once upon a time, autonomous transportation could only be seen in Sci-fi movies. However, this is now certainly the most exciting frontier technology. Tesla, Texas Instruments (TI), Google and other companies are vigorously testing their cars aiming at realising full autonomous driving, which will be a multi-trillion global economy project.



Recently at St Andrews, a group of Year 12 Math Methods students were investigating how to apply their mathematical knowledge to model a car that could enter and exit a parking bay autonomously. Students modelled the path with a various possible of functions, including Trigonometric and Polynomial functions, together with Calculus, Algebra and Problem-Solving skills to program their TI-*n*spire CAS calculator and enable the TI-Rover (autonomous car) to manoeuvre in and out from a parking space with an obstacle car in front.



It is my pleasure to work with our year 12 students to bring the mathematical theories and concepts on paper alive! Although, we have not gotten a successful model (yet!), the discussion, analysis, bouncing back of various questions and ideas together with co-operative teamwork during the process was most invaluable!


Trusting God through this time, has been an opportunity to again put into practice what we have been learning about as staff and students.




Students have relished the opportunity to see their peers, to participate in Zoom devotions each day, and have grown in their understanding of IT.


Also on



display has been an American \$50 Confederacy note. The Confederate States dollar was first issued just before the outbreak of the <u>American Civil</u> <u>War</u> by the newly formed <u>Confederacy</u>. It was not backed by hard assets, but simply by a promise to pay the bearer after the war, on the prospect of

Southern victory and independence. As the Civil War progressed and victory for the South seemed less and less likely, its value declined. After the Confederacy's defeat, its money had no value, and both individuals and banks lost large sums. In the image above, there are two "Invasion" notes, so called as this was the money used in Japan after World War 2 ended.

Amongst the collection in the cabinet has been a "Widow's Mite". This small bronze coin was mentioned in the story of the poor widow in Mark 12



41 Jesus sat down opposite the place where the offerings were put and watched the crowd putting

their money into the temple treasury. Many rich people threw in large amounts. **42** But a poor widow came and put in two very small copper coins, worth only a few cents.

43 Calling his disciples to him, Jesus said, "Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put more into the treasury than all the others. **44** They all gave out of their wealth; but she, out of her poverty, put in everything—all she had to live on."
