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ACTING PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Christian Community - Who We Are

Most people have heard the phrase 'it takes a village to raise a child'. I think it is one of those phrases that we can easily use without truly reflecting on the power and truth of its message. However, over many years within the Haines household this phrase has gained significance and meaning that has shaped and impacted our family. In 2016, our daughter Ellie who was 6 years old at the time was diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder and selective mutism. Ellie is a beautiful and vibrant young girl who we love so much and has so many God given gifts, however my wife and I also noticed some areas of her social, emotional and physical development that were different to what would be considered 'normal milestones'. In the time since her diagnosis, there have been many ups, downs, tears and questions. But what has become enormously clear to us is this notion of the power of 'the village' or in our case, Christian community, in collectively supporting the growth and development of our children.

Our community, particularly for Ellie, spans far and wide - yet it starts within the home. Additional to my wife and I, Ellie's younger brother Oscar has over many years helped her to communicate to others and provide her with social cues when she is too anxious to do so herself. Our church community provided Ellie with a sensory and socially safe environment to enjoy kids church on a Sunday without being overcome with anxiety. When she was learning to swim as a 6-year-old, her swimming teacher used a gentle approach to not place

pressure or expectation on Ellie in order to help her learn to swim in an environment that would otherwise be overwhelming. Her classroom teachers have been empathetic and considerate of unforeseen change creating anxiety for Ellie, and always took extra steps to ensure that she is comfortable in her learning environment. Her friends are patient and considerate of her little nuances, and they prefer to see her for her strengths as a gentle, friendly, fun, smart and happy person who loves to learn.

"I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well."

Psalm 139:14

I know that my daughter is fearfully and wonderfully made, despite the challenges she faces at times as a person on the autism spectrum. That little girl is nearly 12 years old now and will next year be in Year 7, and I am encouraged and heartened to see God working in and through her. I am blessed to share that whilst Ellie still finds things like change, social cues and communication difficult, she is thriving in her learning, social groups and her relationship with God. As a Christian community at St Andrews Christian College, we also believe this for your children. I see St Andrews Christian College as a village or community with Christ at the centre in which we can partner with you to support, shape and stretch your children in all areas of their life and faith.

Enrolments for 2023

We have commenced our planning for 2023 and confirming places for new students to start in Term 1, 2023. Unless we have been advised, we are assuming that all current students will be returning to the College in 2023.

If a student is not returning to the College, in line with the enrolment policy, one term's notice in writing is required. If the notice is not received on time, one term's tuition fees in lieu of notice will be charged. This requirement is clearly noted in the Enrolment Agreement Form which all parents/guardians signed when their child(ren) was enrolled.

To assist our planning please advise the College by Friday 16th September 2022 if a student is not returning to the College in 2023. The notice should be addressed to the College Registrar and can be sent via email to registrar@standrews.vic.edu.au It will be helpful to receive this notice as soon as possible as it will allow us to offer any vacant places to students on our waiting lists.

If there are siblings of current students wanting to enrol at the College, it is important that parents submit an Application for Admission two years prior to the planned year of entry.

This allows the College to provide a priority place for siblings of current students. Siblings are

not guaranteed a place if the Application for Admission is late. Late applicants will be placed onto the waiting list.

Anaphylaxis Awareness

Anaphylaxis is a severe, rapidly progressive allergic reaction that is potentially life threatening. Anaphylaxis is a whole-of-community responsibility. It is imperative, therefore, that as far as practicable, the College should be a safe and supportive environment in which students at risk of anaphylaxis can participate equally in all aspects of the student's schooling.

The key to prevention of anaphylaxis at the College is knowledge of those students who have been diagnosed at risk, awareness of triggers (allergens), and prevention of exposure to these triggers. Partnerships between the College and parents are important in ensuring that certain foods or items are kept away from the student while at the College.


Zart Student Competition

McCrindle Future of Education Report

In a recent Newsletter, I included some extracts from the McCrindle *Future of Education* Report. The report is titled: *Equipping Students to Thrive in the New World of Work* and includes some fascinating insights into the world of work that our young people will be facing. The infographic below summarises the work transitions framing the new world of work.

In this Newsletter, I have included some further detail for the first two transitions listed:

Work transitions framing the new world of work



Manual to machine learning:

Automation has long been a topic of consideration in the new world of work. For many this can elicit feelings of fear while for others a sense of opportunity. With technological advancement replacing some current jobs and creating new jobs for the future, it highlights the need for students to focus on transferable skills and lifelong learning.

Lifelong learning is being driven largely by automation (growth of robotics, data analytics, smarter software), globalisation (greater degree of outsourcing and growth in digital platforms) and demographic realities (such as an ageing population where people live longer and work later). This requires a new mindset and an increased focus on retraining and skills. Gone are the days where one to four years of study after school was sufficient. Rather, workers will increasingly need to develop a habit of refreshing existing skills and learning

Jobs which are increasing in demand include: Data analysts and scientists, Al and machine learning specialists, and Big data specialists.

Technology to human:

new ones.

Closely linked to the rise of automation is the focus on human skills. With automation changing the way we work; it is placing a greater requirement on people to focus on higher order skills and differentiate themselves from the tasks which machines can do. Looking to the future, it is increasingly the human characteristics of collaboration, creativity, critical thinking and curiosity that will set workers apart. The occupational skills required to thrive in the knowledge economy are analytical, cognitive, social and management.

In the future it is likely anything that can be automated will be automated. The tasks humans are most likely to perform are coordinating, developing, managing and advising, reasoning and decision making, communicating and interacting. To effectively future proof students, an education that focuses on developing these skills is essential.

I was privileged to be able to lead a group of Year 4 students last week in some mathematical problem solving. The lesson focussed on a design activity where students were posed with the following problem:


Four Cube Houses.



Students have until early September to meet the challenge by reading fifteen books.


