Supporting parents of children with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) meeting

A number of families in the College have students who have a diagnosis of ASD (Autism Spectrum Disorder). Towards the end of Term 2, we invited parents of these students to meet via Zoom to share advice and experiences and to encourage one another. Eight families were



represented by at least one parent at this meeting.

Mrs Shirley Gillie, our Head of Learning Support, Mrs Wendy Punay, our Primary Learning Support Teacher and our Chaplain Rev Warwick Grant attended. We agreed that it was good to encourage one another in the challenges that we face caring for these children at home and school. Of course, those attending were not compelled to share, but for those who did, we agreed that we would trust one another not to share beyond the group any information that was not about our own family.

At our second meeting (details below), we will share strategies that parents have found successful with their children in online learning, and in life in general. We will also discuss helping them transition back to face-to-face classes whenever that may occur. We had hoped to have our second meeting at the College in person, but for obvious reasons, this has not been possible.

The second of these meetings which will occur online via **ZOOM will be at 8:00pm – 9:00pm on Thursday, October** 7.

Parents of children with ASD are most welcome whether you were able to attend the first meeting or not.




PRIMARY SCHOOL FAMILY KAHOOT NIGHT





Is there Hope anywhere?

Based on a video devotion prepared for our Secondary Students earlier this term

In the middle of the Covid-19 Pandemic, going in and out of lockdowns, can we find Hope anywhere? People who trust in Jesus would say "Yes, absolutely!", there is a certain Hope that anyone can have. Mr Grant explains:

Weird times!

You have to admit, we are living in weird times! Yes, these times are stressful, challenging, uncertain, restrictive and for some, anxious, lonely and depressing. They are also weird, however you look at it. So if you are feeling unsettled at the moment – that is completely understandable!

Is there hope anywhere?

So can we have any hope? From the Christian perspective, the answer is always "YES"! I don't just mean that we will eventually somehow learn to live with this virus. I'm talking about Hope for the world with all its people and all its problems – not just the pandemic. And by "Hope", the Christian attitude isn't, "Gosh, I hope things might get better one day." It's not wishful thinking! No – the Christian Hope is a certain Hope, a real Hope, that knows that under Jesus Christ, all things WILL be made right one day. Let me explain.

Jesus comes to the earth the first time

Many of us remember that when Jesus first came to the earth he was born many years ago in a little town called Bethlehem. He grew up and showed God's power and love and taught the people about God and his Kingdom. By dying on the cross, Jesus took the punishment for sin for everyone who trusts in him, so that they can be forgiven by God and have their sins washed away. God showed that he had accepted Jesus' sacrifice by raising him from death. Jesus had defeated sin and death, and all who trust in him share in this victory.

Jesus will come to the earth a second time

The Bible also teaches that Jesus will come a second time to the earth. This won't be like the first time! Everyone will know and see the return of Jesus! The Bible sometimes calls this the "Day of the Lord". As Luke 17:24 describes Jesus in his return, "... will be like the lightning, which flashes and lights up the sky from one end to the other." So when will all this happen? The Bible does not tell us. Even Jesus said that he did not know but only the Father knows (Mark 13:32). It could be later today! It could be next week. It might not be for many years. We don't know. One of Jesus' disciples; Peter, wrote two letters which are recorded for us in the New Testament of the Bible. In the second one of these, he elaborates on this (2 Peter 3). Peter explains that God is patiently waiting for people to turn back to him and accept his offer of forgiveness, because once Jesus returns, that opportunity will be gone forever. Peter says that the Day of the Lord will come like a

thief – in the sense that a thief doesn't let the house owner know when he is coming. Jesus will return suddenly and many people will not be expecting him. On this day, it seems that everything as we know it will be destroyed – God's people of course will be protected. Peter is attempting to describe the indescribable! But the Hope I mentioned earlier can be found in 2 Peter 3:13.

It says, "**But in keeping with his promise we are looking forward to a new heaven and a new earth, the home of righteousness**". "Righteousness" means "goodness"! Can you imagine that? There is nothing bad in the new heaven and the new earth! No pandemic, no disease at all, no pain, no poverty, no corruption, no hatred, no violence, no war, no greed, no sin or evil of any kind – and no death. Is this too good to be true? Well – it is good, and it is true. In the Bible God has always kept his promises. Since God keeps his Word, this promise of Jesus' return will be kept also. We just don't know when. But we need to be ready for it – trusting in Jesus and accepting his forgiveness.

The "in-between" times

So we live in the "in-between times" in that we live in-between Jesus' first arrival on earth and the second one that I have described above. We know and understand God's love, revealed through Jesus especially in his death on the cross and his resurrection, and we still see the brokenness of the world around us. But we look forward to the Day of the Lord and God establishing "...a new heaven and a new earth, the home of righteousness". Think of it as heaven and earth as we understand them being joined together. This will be forever – and YOU are invited to participate in this.

What is your response?

So we can have **certain** Hope in what God has promised! God invites each of us individually to trust in him through Jesus. So I invite you to place your trust in Jesus Christ. Accept that he died on the cross to take the punishment for your sins. Receive his forgiveness and love. Know the Hope that he gives you that you will be at home with him forever in the new heaven and a new earth, the home of righteousness. While we wait for him to establish this, followers of Jesus are called by God to be agents of his truth, love and life in this broken world - including during the Covid-19 pandemic.

NAPLAN Results - Congratulations

As you would be aware, the NAPLAN results for 2021 have just been released and parents of students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 whose children completed the tests will have received a copy of their child's NAPLAN Report. It is my pleasure to be able to report that students from St Andrews Christian College have achieved outstanding results in these National Tests.


To assist in understanding how NAPLAN results can be interpreted, the following information and diagram may be useful.

Student outcomes for the five NAPLAN domains: Reading, Writing, Spelling, Grammar and Punctuation, and Numeracy, are provided as scaled scores. These scores range from 0 to 1000, and form the numeric continuum from which the ten national reporting bands are derived. The National Assessment Program scale maps student outcomes onto a tenband continuum.

National, State and school distributions are presented as box-and-whisker plots graphed against the bands relevant for the year level as follows:


- Year 3 results are reported in Band 1 to Band 6. Band 2 is the National Minimum Standard.
- Year 5 results are reported in Band 3 to Band 8. Band 4 is the National Minimum Standard.
- Year 7 results are reported in Band 4 to Band 9. Band 5 is the National Minimum Standard.
- Year 9 results are reported in Band 5 to Band 10. Band 6 is the National Minimum Standard.

The expectation is that each Year 5, 7 and 9 student would progress one band in each testing area across the two-year period. Year 3 students would be expected to progress two bands in each testing area.




The following graphs indicate the performance of St Andrews Christian College students relative to the performance of all students in Victoria.




Year 5

Mathematical Problem Solving

Congratulations to one of our parents, John O'Donnell, who submitted the following solution to "The Farmer's Puzzle" :

A hundred dollars a farmer paid For a hundred animals 'through the trade' Sheep cost ten dollars and pigs cost two Hens cost fifty cents. What did she do?

Your task was to determine how many of each animal the farmer purchased.

John's answer is:

1 sheep x \$10.00 = \$10 27 pigs x \$2.00 = \$54 72 chickens x \$0.50 = \$36

Total animals = 100, Total cost = \$100

A second answer is: 4 sheep x \$10.00 = \$40 8 pigs x \$2.00 = \$16 88 chickens x \$0.50 = \$44

I was trying to solve by logic and substituting numbers to try and get the answer, and initially thought there was no answer. Then I did a spreadsheet, and did every possible combination of 0-10 sheep, 0-50 pigs, 0-200 chickens which gave me the answers.

Some of the key points to note in the solution are:

Solutions will be found by working in an organised way through every case. However, there is no point in checking chickens that are not a multiple of 4 because only multiples of 4 chickens require the multiples of \$2 which must be available to swap for pigs (\$2) or sheep (\$10).

- 200 is the largest possible number of hens to spend \$100, but 200 hens is more than the total number of animals allowed.
- We could start with 100 hens, but this wouldn't work as it would "use up" all of the animals but only spend \$50.
- So, if there is a solution, it must be less than 100 hens and also be less in multiples of 4.

Working in an organised way with this extra information, and using a table to record results, produces:

New Activity – Dice Footy

Given that we are in the midst of the AFL Football Finals, an activity which you might like to try as a family is the game of dice footy.

Take a standard six-sided dice and use this to simulate a football game. The first roll of the dice is the number of goals scored in the quarter and the second dice roll is the number of behinds. The total score for the quarter is found by multiplying the number of goals by 6 (6 points for a goal) and then adding the number of behinds. Record your scores for each quarter and see who wins the game.

An example is as follows:

You might like to play a "season" and record the scores after each round. Even play a finals series and see which team wins.

A mathematician might be interested in a range of different questions about the scores.

- a) What is the maximum score possible?


English as an Additional Language

SECONDARY SCHOOL

Year 9 Humanities – WW1 A Biblical Reflection

A Biblical Reflection of this period of our history

God is good. As many have questioned God's intent, capacity to control, relevance or even existence during difficult times we reflect on World War One.

God created order, authority, and relationships to reflect his character, most fully experienced in community (cf. Rom 7:4). We bear that image and that mandate to steward and continue to create. These relationships also extend into all of the created realm as does our mandate to care. All these things have been distorted and abused due to sin. Political structures were corrupted to be used as weapons for power over others rather than as channels to serve and empower (cf. Matthew 20:20-28). Institutional, nationalistic and militaristic fervour denied the intrinsic value of the other as also created in God's image (cf. Gen 1:27). Idols of empire were reinforced. Alternative stories to the gospel's massage of acknowledgement of sin and reconciliation through Christ (2 Cor 5: 18) as the path to the good life were promoted. God's people, the natural and built environment, and political and cultural norms, (as a fulfilling of God's charge to "fill the earth" - albeit also distorted by sin), were killed, damaged and subverted.

The secular humanistic understanding of the inevitable societal progress of the West was challenged in two ways simultaneously. It became self-evident that the origins of the war

were greed and self-interest, and an idolatry of nation and empire, in "lording it over others" (Matthew 20:25) in both in the domestic and, through the imperialistic conquest and colonisation, international fields. This was the rational thought championed by the wise of the age, as the 'way of salvation'. However, it is in the exercise of leadership



through servanthood that one becomes great in Jesus' Kingdom (Matthew 20:26-28).

It also became clear that the consequences of war were the second challenge to the secular humanist understanding of inevitable societal progress. Technological innovation and scientific advancements were continued to be hailed by Scientism as evidence of this natural progress following the Industrial Revolution. However, instead these developments enabled warfare to be conducted on an industrial scale, with a consequentially massive death toll. Science is simply a tool to be used for good or evil. At this time it was predominantly used as a means of giving flesh to a cultural story – a making of the world in our image. What was a localised conflict became a global catastrophe.

Even in the midst of military conflict evidence for the Kingdom was still evident. The 'Christmas Truce' demonstrated that our image bearing of God can still be displayed in community in the valuing of the enemy soldier as human, like the combatants on their side. Those who wrestle with understanding God's care and protection in these extreme days can find solace: Psalm 23:4 "though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death I will fear no evil, for you are with me." We anticipate a new heaven and a new earth: the new Jerusalem (Revelation 21:1,2) – God's renewal of his good creation. This is a redemption of empire, where there is healing for the nations (Rev 22:2) and "All nations will come and worship before you" - for those who worship the true God as their saviour and King.

A renewed desire to not repeat this episode, the "war to end to end all wars", was to fail within a generation. Could the sacred claim that "Greater love hath no man", (John 15:13) etched into the floor of the Shrine of Remembrance in Melbourne to remember those killed in conflict, be the origin of the new secular Australian idol of the Anzac legend?

We long for restoration... "Come, Lord Jesus" Revelation 22:20






PERFORMING ARTS

Sing to him a new song; play skilfully, and shout for joy. **Psalm 33:3**






Need resources while the school library is closed?
