I want that desperately for our students, the leaders of the future. Leaders that bring to this world His hope, His love and grace.



### **ICAS Medal Winner**

Congratulations to Nathan Miao in Year 4 who is a medal winner in the ICAS Science Competition.

ICAS (UNSW Global Assessments) is an independent, skills-based assessment program which recognises and rewards student achievement. ICAS is unique, being the most comprehensive generally available suite of academic assessments for primary and secondary school students.

Students with the top score in each subject in each year level are awarded a medal and

certificate.

Last year over 980,000 entries were received but only 514 students from Australia and 100 students from New Zealand and the Pacific Region were awarded medals for their outstanding achievement.

Nathan will receive his award at an official ceremony later in the year. Congratulations to Nathan on this significant achievement!

- Yellow paper bins being used in each classroom and in the yard for all paper and card rubbish (and some mixed plastic recyclables).

The notice should be addressed to the College Registrar and can be sent via email to <a href="mailto:registrar@standrews.vic.edu.au">registrar@standrews.vic.edu.au</a> It will be helpful to receive this notice as soon as possible as it will allow us to offer any vacant places to students on our waiting lists.

If there are siblings of current students wanting to enrol at the College, it is important that parents submit an enrolment application at the commencement of the year prior to their planned entry. This allows the College to provide a priority place for siblings of current students.

Two weeks ago, we held a VTAC information evening for all Year 12 students and their families. It was fantastic to see our Year 12 students engaged and thinking about what they will be doing next year as they leave St Andrews.

Looking out over the group, however, I was struck by the question, "what will they be taking with them as they leave?"

As with most discussions regarding post-school options, the topics of ATARs, University entrance, and study scores come to the forefront of the conversations. I believe it's important that we talk through these options with students and families. There is a vast array of paths available to students

as they leave Secondary School. It can be overwhelming, and we want our students to be as informed and prepared for what comes next in their academic journeys.

The end of High School is the beginning of a wealth of possibilities for students, not the end. Where they go from here will send them far and wide, in many different directions. The individual lessons about Newton's Laws, or the structure of Parliament may not be what students remember. However, no question there will be lessons learned from their time at St Andrews.

In C.S. Lewis' book Mere Christianity he writes, "Look for yourself, and you will find in the long run only hatred, loneliness, despair, rage, ruin, and decay. But look for Christ and you will find Him, and with Him everything else thrown in." I pray we are equipping students to take this reality with them— ATARs, careers, test results, people or money are not a measure of success but a relationship with God is the most valuable thing in life.


### Work Experience 2018

### Junior Music Extravaganza!




On 22 August we held our very first Primary


