GOD SPEAKS!

The God who Christians worship is a speaking God. God is not silent!

He is certainly not silent about himself. He reveals himself in the things that he has made, for example, Psalm 19 begins with the words, “The

heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands.” And there is a verse in the first chapter of Romans in the Bible that states; “*For since the creation of the world God’s invisible qualities—his eternal power and divine nature—have been clearly seen, being understood from what has been made, so that people are without excuse.”*”

Throughout the Old Testament part of the Bible, God continued to speak through his messengers, like prophets, but the climax of God speaking to us is in the sending of his Son, the Lord Jesus. The beginning of another letter in the Bible, the letter to the Hebrews, puts it like this; *“In the past God spoke to our ancestors many times and in many ways through the prophets, but in these last days he has spoken to us through his Son.”*

God’s Son is Jesus – who is fully God and fully man. His words and his life most clearly reveal God to us. But not just Jesus’ words in the Bible do this. Christians regard the whole Bible as God’s words to us. Even though the words of the Bible were written down hundreds of years ago, God still uses them today to speak to people and to reveal himself to them. Another phrase from the Bible says, *“...the word of God is alive and active...”* (Hebrews 4:12).

So the Bible is, if you like, a dynamic document! It’s not just “print on a page!” The apostle Paul, when writing to the young Timothy, reminded him: *“All Scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching the truth, rebuking error, correcting faults, and giving*

instruction for right living, so that the person who serves God may be fully qualified and equipped to do every kind of good deed.” (2 Tim 3:16, 17)

So the Bible is essential for everyone who follows & trusts in Jesus. It is the main way that God speaks to us. That is why we seek at St Andrews Christian College to take God’s Bible seriously, because we know that as we read and study it God will teach us what is true, he will challenge, help and correct us, and teach us the right way to live and equip us for good deeds.

Give God the opportunity to speak to you clearly by reading his Bible. There are many good resources available to help us read, understand and apply the things God wants us to know from His Bible.

Feel free to email me and I can suggest where you could get these resources. I’m also happy to suggest how you can start reading the Bible regularly if this is something that you have not done before.

NAPLAN RESULTS

The 2018 NAPLAN results have been released to the College and reports have been sent home to each student who sat the tests. As a general overview, when we consider each of the areas tested at every year level, we have continued to perform at a high level compared to the State average. Students who have continued at St Andrews have achieved growth, confirming that the longer a student journeys through our College, the higher their growth. This is a testament to the quality of our teaching staff and the programs that form a part of our curriculum. From deeper analysis of our current results, we have identified writing as an area that we will continue to strengthen.

We continue to consider it a privilege to be responsible for sharing the learning journey of your children. We do recognise that academics is only one area that forms that make up of the whole child. These assessments do not account for the spiritual development of each of our students. At St Andrews, we recognise that each student is uniquely made in God's image and we are committed to helping each child uncover their purpose in Christ.

Meeting all of the kids!! And seeing their lifestyle and being able to make relationships with them. Also being able to help and make a difference.

What are you wanting to learn on the trip?

One question I would like answered throughout this trip is why all the children I see on adverts in the papers and on TV look so happy, since they have so little compared to us.

I'd like to find out more about peoples' everyday lives in Cambodia and the challenges they face and how we could possibly help out.

I would like to know what life is like in Cambodia.

I would like to find out the differences in lifestyle and culture that we have in Australia compared with that of Cambodia. I'd like to see what sort of

traditions they have and how their day to day lives compare with ours.

submit an enrolment application at the commencement of the year prior to their planned entry. This allows the College to provide a priority place for siblings of current students.

Ping Pong-A-Thon

PING PONG-A-THON



On the 14th of September, the Senior School got out their table tennis bats and participated in the 24 hour Ping Pong-A-Thon. The Ping Pong-A-Thon is a fundraising and advocacy movement that aims to raise money and awareness to the

issue of human trafficking, slavery and the exploitation of young people in South-East Asia. This is done through 24 hour table tennis events where money is raised and split between 8 partner organisations that aim to care, educate and rescue those who have been affected by human trafficking and slavery.

After last year's success involving the VCE boys, who beat a \$3,000 goal to raise \$3,675, we incorporated everyone in Senior School, boys and girls, Years 9-12. Our goal was raised to \$10,000 to match the change in participants and awareness of the event. As of the time of writing this, we have raised a total of \$11,042, this is over


3 times the amount raised last year! We were the first event of the entire Ping Pong-A-Thon campaign this year, so our efforts really set a standard and a mark to reach for the majority of events that will be held in October.



The 24 hours were split into time-slots from 9am Friday to 9am Saturday. Year 9s and 10s had their own slots while VCE students played from periods 3-6. After school until around 9pm, everyone in senior school was able to play, this was the most action packed time of the day. From 9pm the night shift commenced, a few boys were willing to stay the whole night and keep at least one game going the whole time. Breakfast was selflessly and generously provided by Mrs deMeester and Mr Gibbs which kept us going until 9am.

A huge thank you for everyone who donated, whether student, parent, staff member or friend, your contribution will go a long way to changing the lives of people who are unfairly treated and deserve a chance to live a life that is free. A very big thank you to Mr Presant, Mr Batty, Mrs

deMeester and Mr Gibbs for being willing to take time out of their busy lives to help supervise and look after us. A special thanks to Addison Tucker and Ben Humphreys who added their name to the prestigious list of 'The 24 Hour Club.' And a special mention to Zane To, Becky Schenker and Addison Tucker who were our top 3 fundraisers.



I am very thankful for everyone's efforts this year, organising this has been so much fun and seeing everyone taking a stand and getting involved was a very rewarding experience.





DEVOTIONS IN 3D





A bit about me

I joined St Andrews at Year 7, having spent the first few years of my schooling in South Korea, then the remainder of the primary years at a Catholic primary school in Melbourne.

The years I spent in Catholic school had confused me. I was surrounded by kids who didn't attend church regularly, as well as parents and teachers with loose Christian values. God

became less important in my life. My interests lay more on things of the world and grew desensitised to sin.

While I grew up in a Christian household, external influences convinced me to doubt and ask questions such as: "Does God exist?"; "How do I know the Bible is real anyway?"; "What has Jesus got to do with me?"; and "How much could I do wrong and still get away with it?"

St Andrews was totally different. Every Monday meant Assembly, where the entire school came together to sing, pray and hear words of wisdom from Mr Speck, our Principal at the time, and sometimes from students and other guests. Every

morning meant devotionals and sharing in prayer, led by the homeroom teacher or my peers. I can't say I enjoyed these at the time, but now I miss being surrounded by God's people and feeling so protected.

As well as my time at St Andrews, church life and family life really helped me continue in the faith God gave me. It wasn't always an upward curve though, especially when I started university in 2010, straight after graduating high school.

Life beyond St Andrews

Not knowing what to do next, I accepted an offer from the University of Melbourne to study Media and Communications. It was my first preference, but only because its entry requirement was a high score, higher than any of my other preferences, and I hadn't thought it likely that I'd get in.

I started the course hoping to emerge as a journalist, but the more I studied, the more I disliked the work, my peers, and the culture of the industry. I found writing to be a joyless exercise. I found my peers competitive, vicious and heartless. I found the lecturers self-absorbed, cryptic and simply unhelpful. I felt like I was learning nothing.

Despite my less-than-positive experience at university, I did learn a lot – mostly from exposure to people so different to me and to the people I had known. I made many Muslim friends and gay friends. I met many atheists. Agnostics. Socialists. Conservatives. This was the first true and confronting picture of the world I saw, outside of high school.

I moved on to study some more, to see if that would give me a direction in life. I did a year of masters in speech pathology, then quit. I completed a certificate in teaching English as a second language, but never became a teacher. I got a casual job at RMIT University in admin, which evolved into many different roles involving marketing and communications, to my role now: Conversion and Customer Engagement Coordinator.

You won't believe how many different jobs are actually out there. No one at school was able to teach me that. It's something you must see for yourself. There are also so many ways to get a job. While I was at RMIT, I was headhunted for a Marketing Manager role at La Trobe College, where I worked for a few months, then returned to RMIT.

Relationships, failures, decisions

In the midst of all the studying and working, I had my fair share of partying and failed relationships, all of which were not right for me. I learnt a lot through dating and meeting different people, and felt God's hand pluck me out of the really unhealthy lifestyles and relationships.

Growing up meant making decisions for yourself. Almost 10 years into my adulthood, I realised that I was always going to make mistakes. I was always going to sin. I was always going to make selfish decisions.

But what kept me hopeful was that Christ died for my sins, and I'm always granted a second chance – multiple chances, even. I'm sure I've used up

thousands of chances, I'm sure, but thankfully, there's no limit to God's grace and mercy.

If there's any lesson I've learnt from life so far, it'd be that God never lets go of His children. No one can snatch you out of His hand. No matter how many dumb decisions you make, no matter how much you repeatedly make the same mistakes, God will bring you out of the mess, and closer to Him. I've learnt not to worry about my past, present or future, but to stay content with what I have been given.

The best thing you can do is continue praying and reading God's word to hear what He has to say to you, and enjoy the fullness of His love.

Any advice?

It's almost been 10 years since I left high school, and I've grown in ways I could never have imagined. I'd never been a person with any clear goals or dreams. Maybe you're like me. I'd never expected to be working in marketing, or that I'd be working at a university. I might not stay in marketing. I might change my career to try something completely different. I don't know.

What I do know is that wherever God is leading you, you're in good hands, in the hands of someone who knows you better than you do, and has plans for you beyond your dreams. Trust Him always. Thank Him, and try to stay content in everything He's given you. He may defy your will and steer you in an unexpected direction. But He'll be with you on every journey, the good ones and the bad ones.


