



A Tribute to "Crazy for You" - A 'Zoomsical'

Dear College Community,

I am so pleased to be able to share the links to our 2020 College "Zoomsical" with you, "A Tribute to *Crazy for You*".



At the start of the year, when we talked to the production students about our Psalm 33:3 mission statement for our planned College musical production, we had no idea the challenges that this year would bring. The motto of "Sing to him a new song; play skillfully, and shout for joy" has permeated all that we have done as a Performing Arts department while working on this project.

When so many things were uncertain for our students this year, and so many things they usually get to do at school were taken away, we knew that continuing to provide a theatrical opportunity and a community for them was very important. As a team, we committed to seeing the project through, in whatever form was possible.

Adapting performing to an online setting had all sorts of challenges! How do you act with others, when you are isolated from each other? How do you involve 75 actors in scenes, when Zoom doesn't allow you to talk at the same time as each other? How do you dance and sing in time with others, when Zoom involves a delay and struggles to record music? How do you make a set, or incorporate props?

We are so proud of our creative students, who have risen to work with, and meet those challenges time and time again. We know they have learned so much through being part of a unique "Zoomsical" experience. It is hard to remember sometimes, when watching them perform, that they are acting alone, in their homes, to an iPad screen!

In creating this show, we aimed to find a balance between making the show work as a "Zoomsical" by having students record footage alone and in groups, using existing rehearsal footage, and giving the students an authentic experience performing with and in front of others. As you watch, you may find it useful to have the attached synopsis of the show handy, so you can follow the story more easily.

We offer this Zoomsical to the College Community as a gift for your enjoyment, with love from the staff and students involved.



Brief outline:

Prep to Year 11 - Monday 5th October - Student Free Day - NO School for students

PREP, YEARS 1 & 2

- **Tuesday 6th October** Students will return to remote on-line learning from home.
- Monday 12th October Students will return to face-to-face learning at school normal times. Face masks for junior students are optional.

YEARS 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 & 9

• **Tuesday 6th October** - Students will return to remote on-line learning from home and continue with this arrangement until further advice from the Government.

YEAR 10

- Tuesday 6th October Students will return to remote on-line learning from home.
- Wednesday 7th October Remote on-line learning BUT no Unit 1&2 classes (if enrolled) due to the GAT.
- Monday 12th October Face-to-face learning begins at school with timetabled classes.

Face masks to be worn all the time, except for eating/drinking and energetic PE classes.

YEAR 11

- **Tuesday 6th October** Students will return to remote on-line learning from home and begin Unit 1&2 classes.
- Wednesday 7th October Remote on-line learning BUT no Unit 1&2 classes due to the GAT.
- Monday 12th October Face-to-face learning begins at school with timetabled Unit 1&2 classes.

Face masks to be worn all the time, except for eating/drinking and energetic PE classes

- Monday 5th Friday 9th October Online Unit 3&4 Practice Exams. No Unit 3&4 classes during this time.

- Tuesday 13th October Unit 3&4 timetabled classes begin at school.

Cardus Education Survey (CES) Australia – Australian Schools and the Common Good

Cardus is a Canadian-based independent think tank dedicated to the renewal of social architecture that has, since 2011, been gathering and analysing data about the ways secondary school graduates in Canada and USA contribute to and engage with the common good in early adulthood. The Cardus Education Survey (CES) Australia was funded and coordinated by a consortium project team consisting of six Australian Christian school associations. During October – December 2019 a group of nearly 5000 Australians aged 25 – 39 who graduated from Secondary School between 1998 and 2011 were surveyed.

The Cardus Education Survey Australia report seeks to identify and quantify how this group of Australians - popularly named Millennials - contribute to the flourishing of Australian communities. It explores the extent to which these contributions are evident many years after they graduated. The insights within this report highlight the role schools and educational sectors play in preparing their students for contributing to the common good. The aim of students contributing to the common good is not just for self-interest but for active and meaningful engagement with and for society as a whole – civically, socially and religiously.

Education in Australia has historically focused on the responsibility of schools to instil values that go beyond self-interest and personal benefit. Schools as social institutions have played a significant role in helping to form engaged and responsible citizens. Through education, young people are prepared and shaped into the kinds of people who can enrich and benefit their neighbours and the community. All Australian schools, from all sectors share responsibility for the flourishing of Australian society. This important task is not just the responsibility of school education alone but requires a partnership with the home and wider community to shape the lives of young people.

The Report categorised results in the following six areas: Formation, Work, Belonging, Generosity, Family and Religion. A brief summary of some of the key findings is outlined

below:

Formation: The concept of formation refers to the way that schools shape the values and character of young people throughout their schooling experience. Christian school graduates believe their school prepared them to find a sense of meaning, purpose and direction in life and also equipped them to deal with personal relationships.

Generosity: The common good is promoted through Millennials' generosity in giving and volunteering once they have graduated. Overall, Christian school graduates volunteer most frequently.

Religion: Millennial Christian school graduates are most likely to have prayed, engaged with a religious text or attended a religious service at least monthly in the past 12 months. This spiritual formation and the commitment to practices of faith are the outcomes of both the educational context and the familial influence.

Each Australian school graduate is not merely an individual but a member of a community and flourishing is only fulfilled if it is evident in both the individual and the community. This posture needs to be cultivated more widely in an increasingly self-interested and privatised public square. It requires a shift in cultural thinking to view the benefits that accumulate for society as a whole are greater than the benefits received by individuals separately. Christian schools and their communities have a vital role to play in shaping our country's identity and character.




In Science and Humanities we looked at 'What Is On The Earth?'







Year 4 students Anders Pees and Erin Bird wrote a comic cartoon in English, using words from their spelling list. They integrated the words so well with their story.












We hope to have an exhibition of works at the College later in Term 4 (we pray!) and to showcase perhaps an online exhibition of these works in Term 4 – stay tuned!





"The Year 2s had the opportunity to dress up as their favourite book or bring along their favourite book to our Zoom. We had so much fun hearing about what each other enjoy reading."




Health

Year 10 is an exciting year and the YEAR 10 CAREERS PROGRAM will help our students develop new skills and prepare for the future. Students will learn about budget and saving strategies, investment and

entrepreneur principles, workers' rights and responsibilities and employer expectations.

START SMART includes a series of six interactive financial literacy workshops: Smart Choices, Earning, Saving, Spending, Investing and Enterprise.

STEER YOUR CAREER & THE FUTURE OF WORK will be delivered by RMIT's Skills and Jobs Centre. RESUME & INTERVIEW SKILLS workshops are practical sessions. Our partners from Box Hill Institute will facilitate these sessions.

The **VicRoads ROAD SMART** Program is an exciting new education program that helps prepare our beginner drivers for a lifetime of safe driving. It includes road rules and provides students with a fundamental understanding of the causes of road trauma and the importance of safe driving.

THE POWER OF COLLABORATIVE LEARNING

Learning with other students can be a very powerful way to improve your learning outcomes. There are many benefits to learning to work with others.

MOTIVATION: Studying together can be much more motivating than studying on your own.

DEEPEN UNDERSTANDING: Discussing with a friend, being able to bounce ideas off each other, ask each other questions – all of these activities help strength networks and deepen understanding.

DIFFERENT PERSPECTIVES: Sometimes we don't realise that we are only looking at things in one particular way and there are different and diverse viewpoints to ours. Learning with a friend can help students see things in a different light and broaden their perspective.

BUILD TEAMWORK SKILLS: Learning to cooperate, negotiate and problem solve with other people is a great skill to have in later life.

Thursday 10th September was the annual reminder to check in on those around us, starting the conversation with the simple question "R U OK?"

Last week devotions were dedicated to this, with students from the Student Wellbeing Team (thanks so much Harry Rowland, Emily Hughes and Amy Muggeridge) and teachers encouraging our students to reach out and care for those who may be struggling with their mental wellbeing.



The Bible gives us many examples about looking after others:

- Titus encouraged Paul: But God, who comforts the downcast, comforted us by the coming of Titus (2 Corinthians 7:6)
- God wants us to care for those who may not necessarily be our friends: the good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37)
- Proverbs 17:17: A friend is always loyal, and a brother is born to help in time of need (New Living); A friend loves at all times, and a brother is born for a time of adversity (NIV)

What if you're not OK?

Strategies to help improve wellbeing:

- Thankfulness diary (write 3 things a day that you're thankful for)
- Perform a random act of kindness (big or small) every day
- Get the basics right: talk to God, read the Bible, eat and sleep well, drink plenty of water; get some fresh air, sunshine and exercise!
- Routine is important eg. make your bed!
- Acknowledge your feelings; accept them and don't overthink them
- Give yourself some things to look forward to: a Zoom bake-off or a meal swap
